Your Voting Rights

You have the right to vote by yourself, or with help from a person you choose

You have the right to vote the way you want

You have the right to get help if someone tries to stop you from voting

Even if you have a conservator or guardian, you have a right to vote unless a judge specifically said you cannot

You have the right to be shown how to mark your choices on the ballot

If you are in line when the poll closes, you must be allowed to vote

PAVA is funded by the Federal Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) as a provision of the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) of 2002.

What Voter Services Are Offered

Education & Outreach

Educate voters and persons involved in the electoral process about the rights of citizens with disabilities

Information & Referral

Provide information to people with disabilities about voter registration

Provide assistance with access issues on Election Day

Systems Advocacy

Work with groups representing individuals with disabilities and other organizations in registering voters and surveying polling places for accessibility

Representation

Represent individuals who have complaints about the electoral process

Register to Vote

Register to vote at any DisAbility Rights Idaho office

Register to Vote!!

You are eligible to vote if you. . .

Will be at least 18 years old on Election Day;

are a citizen of the United States; and

have resided in Idaho and in the country for 30 days

You are not eligible to vote if you. . .

have been convicted of a felony and have not had your civil rights restored; or

are confined in prison on conviction of a felony criminal offence

Register to Vote by Mail:

Application must be postmarked by October 8, 2010

Register to Vote at the polls on Election Day
